O COME, O COME, EMMANUEL: THE PLEA & THE PROMISE

week of november 29th, 2020 LUKE 1:26-38 (NIV)

big idea of the week:

Leaders, this is to assist you in your facilitation. If your discussion veers off the rails, you can try to steer the conversation back to this theme.

Jesus is the fulfillment of our waiting for a savior.



OPEN

welcome: Connect and check in with everyone briefly before the study starts.

opening prayer: Feel free to ask someone to open with prayer, asking God to speak to through his word. **purpose:** To be changed by Jesus; submitting to the Holy Spirit, scripture, and each other for transformation. **guidelines:** Please read, review, or discuss weekly. The group guidelines are listed on the last page.

STORY

setting the scene: A brief context for the passage. See last page.

tell the story: Encourage people to engage with the storyteller rather than look at the handout.

rebuild the story: Review and retell the story together.

read the passage: Always close by reading the passage out loud.

HEAD

to help us examine what the word shows

Leaders, edit/omit questions as needed for your group. (spend about 15 minutes here)

- What stands out to you in this passage?
- What truths do you observe about Jesus in this passage?
- What feelings or expectations do you imagine Mary felt in this interaction?

HEART

to help us wrestle with what we believe

It's important to use "I" statements here. (spend about 30 minutes here)

- Advent means "coming." How do you wait for something that is coming?
- How does who Jesus is transform your waiting?
- How has the Lord met you in moments of waiting, but believing?

HANDS

to help bring the truth into our everyday realities

Try to avoid creating a checklist of things to do better. (spend about 10 minutes here)


- How will you remember Jesus and wait on Him this week?
- How would you describe your relationship with Jesus? How does who He is impact your life?

closing prayer: Lord, we long for you to come. Come, thou King of Nations and bring an end to all our suffering. Lord, bid every pain and sorrow cease and reign now as our Prince of Peace. We wait for you. Amen.

next week's passage: Luke 2:36-38

Ask for a volunteer to story the passage for next week.

FOR CHILDREN & PARENTS

"Come Let Us Adore Him"

An excerpt from Paul David Tripp:

"Ask your children what a promise is and get them to think about why we make promises. Define prophecy for your children (a prophecy is God's promise of what is to come). Talk to them about how many prophecies of Jesus's birth were made long before that first Christmas night. Help them understand that the fact that all these promises about Jesus came true means that we can trust all the promises God makes to us."



LEADER: As we prepare our house for the coming Christmas season, we would also prepare our hearts for the returning Christ.

PEOPLE: You came once for your people,

O Lord, and you will come for us again.

Though there was no room at the inn to receive you upon your first arrival, We would prepare you room here in our hearts and here in our home, Lord Christ.

As we decorate and celebrate, we do so to mark the memory of your redemptive movement into our broken world, O God.

Our glittering ornaments and Christmas trees,
Our festive carols, our sumptuous feasts—
By these small tokens we affirm
that something amazing has happened
in time and space—
that God, on a particular night,
in a particular place, so many years ago,
was born to us, an infant King, our Prince of Peace.

Our wreaths and ribbons and colored lights, our giving of gifts, our parties with friends—these have never been ends in themselves.

They are but small ways in which we repeat that sounding joy first proclaimed by angels in the skies near Bethlehem.

In view of such great tidings of love announced to us, and to all people, how can we not be moved to praise and celebration in this Christmas season? As we decorate our tree, and as we feast and laugh and sing together, we are rehearsing our coming joy!

Setting the Scene

The story of Mary's encounter with the angel Gabriel is the second of four stories Luke uses to point to the birth of Christ. For the gospel writer Luke, the story of the Good News begins where, after 400 years of silence, the voice of God is heard again with the announcement, shortly before each is born, of Jesus and his forerunner John (the Baptist). Our story picks up after John's birth has been foretold.



Scripture

Luke 1:26-38 (NIV)

26 In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent from God to a city of Galilee named Nazareth, 27 to a virgin betrothed to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. And the virgin's name was Mary. 28 And he came to her and said, "Greetings, O favored one, the Lord is with you!" 29 But she was greatly troubled at the saying, and tried to discern what sort of greeting this might be. 30 And the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. 31 And behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus. 32 He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. And the Lord God will give to him the throne of his father David, 33 and he will reign over the house of Jacob forever, and of his kingdom there will be no end."

34 And Mary said to the angel, "How will this be, since I am a virgin?"

35 And the angel answered her, "The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be called holy—the Son of God. 36 And behold, your relative Elizabeth in her old age has also conceived a son, and this is the sixth month with her who was called barren. 37 For nothing will be impossible with God." 38 And Mary said, "Behold, I am the servant of the Lord; let it be to me according to your word." And the angel departed from her.
